"I will bless the LORD at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul makes its boast in the LORD; let the humble hear and be glad" Psalms 34:1-2

None chooses the time they live in, but even in these grey and later days. We have an opportunity to celebrate something unique to our time. Like a comet that flies by earth once every so many hundreds of years, so we have the privilege to celebrate the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation in 2017. However, it would be foolish not to widen the scope and length of this time in order to appreciate what it means. October now begins our journey toward the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary and we know how time flies!

Here are some goals that will build both excitement and honor to, "boast in the Lord" over how the Gospel has become known once again out of the Reformation.



- 1. The challenge will be for everyone in the congregations (adults and children) to read through or listen to the entire Bible. It can be at your own pace or there is a reading schedule provided.
- 2. The focus in Bible Study now turns to the Large Catechism as well as the Formula of Concord. These will serve as reminders of the value to have the Word of God needing to be taught in truth and purity as well as confessed before a hostile world that seeks to distort or destroy the Gospel.
- 3. The newsletter for the next year will include a "highlight" on some figure from the Reformation to recognize it was far more than Martin Luther who God used to carry forth the Gospel.
- 4. The VBS theme for 2017 from Concordia Publishing House to no surprise is going to be, "A Mighty Fortress."
- 5. The last two Sundays of celebrating Reformation 500 will be Joint Services that will include afterward a showing of the soon to be released documentary about Martin Luther.
- 6. Three websites that deserve special attention are: lutheranreformation.org, 1517legacy.com, and CPH.org
- 7. In addition, there will be Circuit worship services, an exhibit from Germany coming to the Minneapolis Institute of Art, along with many other opportunities.





# Firsts' call Lutheran Federal Credit Union 'blessing in many ways'

Just as happy preschoolers wiggle around on the new riding cars at Faith Lutheran Church and School in Stephenville, Texas, Lisa Stroebel happily talks about the time and money her congregation saves with the help of the new Lutheran Federal Credit Union (Lutheran FCU).

"It has really opened up the ability for me as the purchasing agent for our church and school to be able to shop for whatever our church needs more efficiently and cost-effectively," Stroebel, the church's administrator, said of Faith's first corporate credit card, a financial tool she had long searched for and was "first in line" to obtain when Lutheran FCU opened last year.

The lack of a church credit card limited shopping options, "took up time and created hassles" as Stroebel would contact the church treasurer (a busy professional and church volunteer) and wait for checks to be cut.

But when she purchased those riding cars, for example, with Faith's Ministry Classic credit card from

the credit union, the congregation could shop for the best price, use a Groupon discount — impossible, Stroebel says, without a credit card — and save more than \$300 on the popular preschool toys.

This corporate purchasing veteran also appreciates that the credit card "attaches to the church itself and not to the personal information of any individual members."



"There's no other [credit] card like that out there for a church, at least that I could find," said Stroebel, whose church was the first LCMS

congregation to open an account after the credit union's "soft" launch in May 2015 and even before its churchwide opening in January.

"When you're a nonprofit dealing with a budget — a tight budget — your membership entrusts you to handle their money and spend wisely," said Stroebel, who calls the Lutheran FCU "a blessing in so many ways."

#### No fees, better rates

During its first calendar year in business, Lutheran FCU — one of the nation's relatively few faith-based credit unions — is growing with each new member "first," says Jane Dulle, chief operating officer.

"In a church body with such a deep and long history as the LCMS, it isn't too often we have such a celebration of firsts," she said of Lutheran FCU's earliest members, including the Florida-Georgia District, the first LCMS district to join. Business Manager John Elliott calls "no fees and better rates" the driving force behind the move away from a commercial bank where the district had been paying \$2,000 in annual fees. "That's money we can now use for the district's mission to serve, assist and encourage congregations in the ministry of Jesus Christ," he said.

Elliott also values the improved customer service. When he calls, "they know who I am and ask what they can do for me," he said of the credit union. "When I call the bank, that isn't always the case."

Nancy Grommet, a Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) employee, was "right at the front door" when the credit union opened, motivated by the opportunity to save on fees she "learned the hard way" she had been paying to her previous commercial lender.

Fees for an automatic payment "must have been buried in the paperwork," said Grommet, who made the discovery after a payment was missed. She was surprised to learn her financial lender was using a second company to make payments for her.

Rather than calculate the cost of two years of "buried" fees, Lutheran FCU's first car-loan customer prefers to focus on how the credit union helped her refinance her loan and save \$150 on her monthly payment.

#### Individual, churchwide benefits

When chartered in late 2014 by the National Credit Union Administration, Lutheran FCU was cited by the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch* as only the third new federally chartered credit union nationwide that year

and one of a "small fraction" of credit unions with ties to a religious organization.

In June 2015, the ELCA Federal Credit Union joined the faith-based ranks, opened by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Both credit unions are distinct in their missions to support their faith-based communities.

The Rev. Ken Krueger, pastor at Grace Celebration Lutheran Church, Cordova, Tenn., had eagerly followed the development of Lutheran FCU, spearheaded and supported by LCEF. Last May, he was the first rostered church worker to open a credit-union checking account. He has since added a savings account and become a loan customer. Grace Lutheran also is a credit-union member.

As Lutheran FCU vice-chairman, Krueger urges fellow Lutherans to become members "both for the tremendous benefits available to individuals and for the collective benefits of keeping funds within the church and supporting LCMS ministries."

Delegates at the 2016 LCMS convention echoed that encouragement when they passed Resolution 10-02, calling the credit union a "way to connect our LCMS together in a common bond of biblical steward-ship and daily household financial management."

Newlywed Cristel White, Ministerial Care coordinator for Concordia Plan Services, was already on board. She and her husband, Keith, refinanced their first home together in Crestwood, Mo., as the credit union's first-home-loan refinance customers.

Keith, a police officer, praises the "good rates and customer service." Those matter to Cristel,

too. But having grown up in LCMS churches and schools, she especially appreciates that the credit union serves her fellow members and ministries.

"I like the idea of being a bigger part of the LCMS and trying to help each other," Cristel said. "Isn't that what 'Synod' means? Walking together."

## Protecting troops' religious freedom: LCMS calls for clear DoD guidance

In light of the Department of Defense's (DoD's) recently mandated LGBT Pride Month and its new policies for transgender service members which among other things advocate in-service gender transitions while serving in the military, the LCMS has sent a request to the Secretary of Defense to ensure specific protections for chaplains, service members, medical personnel, DoD civilians and other DoD-affiliated employees.



The Synod's request, signed by LCMS President Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison and Chaplain (U.S. Navy Capt. Ret.) Craig Muehler, director of LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces, calls for specific protections for expressing personal religious beliefs to be codified in DoD and service-specific guidance, as service members purportedly are experiencing increasing restrictions on living out their faith in their military vocations.

"Current DoD and service-specific policies and guidance for religious protections do not provide sufficient protections," the Synod's request states, "as they allow for implementation of a wide range of subjective religious restrictions based on what a local commander deems as contrary to 'good order and discipline.'"

Earlier this year, the Synod in convention adopted Resolution 2-04, which reaffirms LCMS military chaplains' rights of free exercise of religion in the face of LGBT inclusion in the armed forces, and Resolution 14-01 to encourage intentional leadership in matters of religious freedom. The Synod in convention also adopted Resolution 14-09, which commends the LCMS Commission on Theology and Church Relations document "Gender Identity Disorder or Gender Dysphoria in Christian Perspective" (click here to see this document and others related to marriage and sexuality).

"The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod clearly spoke in convention this summer that we as a Synod will continue to stand together to support the free exercise of religion and the right of conscience for our LCMS members [and those of other faith groups] who selflessly serve our nation in the military," said Muehler. "The Department of Defense needs to ensure safeguards are in place to protect the rights of those who wish to abstain from any event, practice or activity that will force them to compromise their deeply held religious belief on homosexuality or gender orientation."

He said the request has been sent directly to Secretary of Defense Ashton Carter, to the Armed Forces Chaplains Board (AFCB) and to the Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness, Peter Levine, who oversees the AFCB, Sept. 8. As of Sept. 15, it remains unclear when and how DoD officials will respond.

"We stand to protect service members' God-given, constitutionally protected religious liberties and right of conscience," said Muehler. "No American, especially those who wear the uniform, should be denied their religious freedom or be forced to go against their conscience. The men and women in uniform serving on the front lines to defend our nation should not be penalized for exercising the same freedoms they are fighting to protect."

Muchler said the Chaplain Alliance for Religious Liberty has applauded the Synod's efforts to protect religious liberty in the military, and the organization has shared the Synod's request with other faith groups who might make similar requests to the Defense Department.





### Gutenberg's invention helped spread the ideas of the Reformation to the masses

COULD JOHANNES GUTENBERG HAVE KNOWN WHEN HE FIRST CONCEIVED THE IDEA OF MOVEABLE TYPE that it would contribute to the spread of the Reformation and the Renaissance and lead to the education of all levels of society? One might question his presence in the "Faces of the Reformation" series. But considering that his presses printed not only Luther's 95 Theses but also the papal indulgences that sparked Luther's polemic pen, it seems fitting that he should be included.

Gutenberg was born about 1395 as the son of a metalsmith, and he became acquainted with the printing business at a very young age. His invention of the moveable type press made the mass production of books a reality that would change the world. By 1450, his new invention was operating. As with most new ideas of this scale, the road was not smooth. In 1546, Johann Fust, Gutenburg's financial backer, won a lawsuit against him regarding repayment of the funds. Gutenberg's employee and son-in-law, Peter Schöffer, testified against him. Before this lawsuit was finalized, Gutenberg had printed a Latin Bible that contained 42 lines of Scripture per page. This "42-line Bible" is known as the Gutenberg Bible. The press for the Bible, Gutenberg's masterpiece, along with a second book containing only Psalms, was lost to Fust in the court case. The Psalter was published after the court case with no mention of Gutenberg; only Fust's and Schöffer's names appear as the printers.

Gutenberg never really bounced back financially from losing his press to Fust. He set up another printing press and continued to print, but because he did not put his name in the books and papers he produced, it is not known how much was produced as he competed with his old press shop. In 1465, an honorific title was bestowed on Gutenberg in recognition for his invention. This was accompanied by a salary that supported him until his death three years later.

Gutenberg is often thought of as a contemporary of Luther, but in fact he died 15 years before Luther was born. In Paul's letter to the Ephesians, he declares that "we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (EPH. 2:10). The stage was set for the coming battle between Luther and his followers and the pope and his supporters.

The Reformation has often been called the war of pamphlets. Pamphlets, the quickest and most economical form of printing with moveable type, had been around for decades before Luther started to employ them, but the volume of pamphlets increased as much as one-thousandfold in the first few years after Luther nailed the 95 Theses to the church door. Printing shops sprang up all over Germany, and many came to Wittenberg like moths to a flame. Even the artist Lucas Cranach partnered in a printing business there.

Gutenberg's invention made books more obtainable for the first time in history. The book that helped codify the German language and that was used as a tool in teaching reading was Luther's German Bible. For the first time, Germans could read the Scriptures in their own language at a cost that was within reach for the common man.

Surely Gutenberg would have been amazed at the world-altering events that resulted from the works planned in advance for him to do.
