THE NEW TESTAMENT PASSOVER

"This day shall be for you a memorial day, and you shall keep it as a feast to the LORD; throughout your generations, as a statute forever, you shall keep it as a feast." – Exodus 12:14

"For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's dead until he comes." – 1 Corinthians 11:26

Over the past few months, we've explored two enduring aspects of God's Word from the Old Testament that continue to shape our lives in the New Testament era. First, we delved into the Sabbath and then transitioned to the first day of the Sabbath we observed on the Lord's Day. Then, we discussed the covenant of circumcision, which we now see in the New Covenant of Baptism. This month, we embark on a new journey, a discussion on the third eternal statute that God has given us- the Passover.

Now, right off the bat, what is the Passover? You may recall from reading in the Exodus that God inflicted the Egyptians and their gods with ten plagues. Each plague was against one of the

supposed gods of Egypt (the Nile god, the livestock god, the health god, etc...). The very last plague was directed at the Pharaoh himself. All the firstborns of man and animals would die in the land of Egypt. But God gave a way of escape from His judgment. Anyone who had smeared the blood of an unblemished lamb on their doorposts and lintels would be passed over (Passover). Inside that blood-covered house, the families were to eat a special meal together in preparation for leaving the land of Egypt and slavery behind. The meal consisted of lamb, bitter herbs, unleavened bread, and wine. It was this meal that would mark the passing of Israel from a group of slaves to free people of God. And it was to be a meal, forever, according to Exodus 12:14.

Now, we do not celebrate the Passover as Christians per se. So what gives? How can this be a "statute forever" if we aren't doing it anymore? Well, we are if we pay close attention to our worship. Because on the night in which Jesus was betrayed, he celebrated the Passover with his disciples (Luke 22:15). He celebrated the vast majority of the meal just like any Jewish family would have celebrated it, until the end of the meal. After supper was eaten, a loaf of unleavened bread (think of a tortilla-like bread) was broken to symbolize the breaking of the Jews' slavery

in Egypt and passed around. Then, a big cup of wine would be passed around for all to drink from. It was called the cup of blessing. But on the night when Jesus, the Son of God, was betrayed, he took the bread and broke it and said, "This is my body which is given for you, this do in remembrance of me." Then he took the cup AFTER SUPPER, that cup of blessing, and passed it around, saying, "Drink of it all of you; this cup is the New Covenant in my blood which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins." From that moment on, the New Covenant was established in this eating and drinking of Christ's Body and Blood, The Lord's Supper.

It was not just a memorial meal like in the Old Testament. In other words, the New Passover wasn't just about remembering. Now, this meal had its full purpose realized by Jesus. It was a meal to remember, but also a meal where people receive Christ's Body and Blood. Paul makes this clear when he writes, "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" (1 Corinthians 10:16). And Paul also tells us that the meal is a public

remembrance and confession of what Jesus did, "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's dead until he comes." (1 Corinthians 11:26).

Sometimes, people then ask, "Well, Pastor, if it is the New Passover, then why don't we do it just once a year on the Passover?" That's a fair question. It's because, in the New Testament, we realize that our New Passover in the Lord's Supper is for the forgiveness of sins (which we need all the time) and that it was given for us to do often, as Jesus says. So, the early church devoted themselves to the Apostle's teaching, the prayers, the fellowship, and the "breaking of the bread," which is the Lord's Supper. (Acts 2:42). Paul mentions that whenever the church in Corinth came together (1 Corinthians 11:20 "when you come together"), they attempted to hold the Lord's Supper (unfortunately, it turned into a drunken party c.f. 1 Corinthians 11:17ff).

So, our New Testament Passover is found in the Lord's Supper, which we are blessed to receive nearly every first-day Sabbath here at Trinity and Concordia. It is a meal that is given to us as members of Christ's Body for the forgiveness of our sins and is one of the "marks" of a Christian church and community. In this meal, you are connected all the way back to the days of Moses, Elijah, Jeremiah, Jesus, Peter, and John. We are all connected together in the victory that God has won for us, a victory that defeated much more than Pharaoh but Satan himself. Rejoice in this gift that God gives to you, His people!
